

From your Board of Trustees

As we begin a new year, we are all excited about the many opportunities we continue to embrace for the future of our Village. This year, as with the past few years, we are committed to making smart, effective investments in all sorts of ways that will benefit residents, businesses, and visitors to Briarcliff Manor.

Over the past few years, the Board has taken advantage of historically low interest rates and refinanced long-term bonds, so that the badly needed investment in capital projects could be executed with little tax impact on our property owners. As rates begin to rise, we are even more mindful to make the smartest of investments to keep our Village strong.

As an example, we have bolstered spending in machinery and vehicles for our DPW department. Many projects once outsourced to far more pricey third-party companies are now completed in-house, expanding the training and expertise of our internal staff, and reducing costs to

taxpayers. From water main repairs, and reclaiming space in the Community Center, to a complete renovation of the

Youth Center – all were completed economically with a better equipped DPW department.

We promoted two BMPD officers to fill open sergeant positions, hired four new officers, replaced a rusty police cruiser, replaced a 25-year-old firetruck and an antiquated Fire Chief's vehicle, upgraded our emergency communications systems, all to bolster the safety of our community.

Our recreation investments include a donated batting cage at McCrum, and a new online registration system for all Rec programs. Sales of Pickleball permits to residents as well as non-residents, and a well-attended tournament showcasing our new facilities covered the Village outlay for this new sport in just under a year! This year we will complete the first walking track around the Club Field, continue to update parks and playgrounds throughout the Village, and kickoff planning for a major future upgrade to the Village Pool.

The purchase of 1050 Pleasantville Road, the former site of the Wells Fargo bank, abuts three acres of Village-owned land. This new parcel offers many potential opportunities, including relocating our Police Department and Village Court, neither of which meet the state-of-art requirements that are needed for federal or state grants. The purchase will also provide badly needed staging for construction equipment, and parking, as we undertake the first major streetscape improvements in our Central Business District CBD in over fifty years. A later phase could expand

our retail and residential offerings as the commercial center of the Village grows.

Our focus on additional long-range planning for the CBD will be evident later this year, as we interconnect VH parking and behind-store parking, add dozens of off-street parking spots, and introduce the first electric vehicle charging stations in the Village along this critical corridor.

At the same time, we continue to ensure we attract the best Village staff to run the day-to-day functions of our Village. We celebrated the two-year anniversary of Village Manager Josh Ringel, and continue to welcome new staff for DPW, BMPD, Recreation, Engineering, Treasury, and the Building Department. The Village has undergone a major shift as we fill critical positions to serve our residents.

As we continue to pursue all ways to improve transparency and communication, and improve our use of technology, the Board continues to aggressively encourage designs for long-term projects, creating shovel-ready plans that are most likely to attract outside grant money. Investing in the future of our Village while limiting the impact on property owners has, and will continue to be, a main pursuit this year.

With so much more to come this year, we wish all a happy, healthy new year!



A NOTE FROM CHIEF BUETI

New Officers Promotions

In 2023, the Briarcliff Manor Police Department (BMPD) welcomed four new officers to the department. PO John Conklin, PO Michael Juliano, PO Mackenzie Farrell and PO Joe Rinaldi. All four officers have come over from the previous employer with years of experience and are making a nice transition with their new home. Cody Wilkinson and John Raffaele were promoted to Sergeant this year filling vacancies from retirements. Both have 5 years with the BMPD and taking their new responsibilities in stride. Sgt Wilkinson is the supervisor for our firearms and motorcycle units. Sgt Raffaele is our supervisor of our Field Training program.

Burglary Arrests The BMPD Detective Division made multiple arrests in regards to two home being broken into on August 6th. The first arrest was made on the night of the burglary with the collaborative efforts of our local partners. The Detective Sergeant Galbraith and Detective Chavez worked tirelessly on making the second arrest of a subject who fled the scene that night. They were able to secure an arrest some time later with the help of the Nassau County Police department and the Federal Marshall's Service. The Village will be continuing to expand our traffic program this year through continued equipment purchases.

Awards We would like to congratulate PO Yeager on receiving AAA's 2023 Traffic Safety Hero of the Year award. PO Yeager spearheaded BMPD's Commercial Vehicle Enforcement Unit and received two weeks of vigorous training at the State Police Academy to become a Federal Commercial Vehicle Inspector. Since starting the unit, PO Yeager has removed numerous unsafe trucks from the roadways of Briarcliff Manor. The BMPD received AAA's Traffic Safety Silver Award for our efforts in traffic enforcement. We employed a new targeted enforcement strategy with the assistance of our speed recording devices. The speed recording devices are a result of the village's new Traffic Safety Committee.



Thanks to the tireless efforts of its dedicated volunteers, the Briarcliff Manor Fire Department had its most successful public education season ever. Throughout 12 schools, daycares, and nursery center visits, firefighters and EMTs spread lifesaving information to over 300 local children and educators.

Volunteers went above and beyond to make each visit engaging and impactful. Bob Cerrone, a 50 year member, attended every event, while others like Mike Gradilone, Michael Molinelli, Neal Iaccarino and John Bekisz gave their time again and again. Engine 92 wowed crowds with an exciting water demonstration. And our ambulance crew fielded all kinds of questions about their important job.

The season ended with a visit to the CSI Youth Group that their director called "the best they've had in 20 years." This was thanks to the energy and passion volunteers brought. Kids were thrilled to climb aboard trucks, watch gear demonstrations, and meet their real-life hometown heroes.

Organizer Fatma Ghilan said, "I am so grateful for the volunteers' commitment and enthusiasm this season. It was an honor to work with such dedicated community members." Plans are underway for an even more ambitious public education season next year.

Yield to Emergency Vehicles

The Fire Chief would like to remind the driving public how they can help when they encounter an Emergency Vehicle on the road. Most importantly, when Fire, Ambulance or Police Vehicles are responding to an emergency, please pull over immediately.



When Emergency Vehicles are using lights and sirens, whether it is a Fire Truck, Ambulance, or Police vehicle, remember *they always have the right of way*. They may appear unexpectedly! However, the noise and lights may help you spot emergency vehicles early. The sirens indicate that they need to get somewhere fast. That's why you must respect and make room for them anytime you see or hear them. A wrong decision could put you and the emergency responders at risk. Never follow these vehicles closely.

Please remember, the most important thing you can do in these situations is to pull over immediately. Let these vehicles pass safely. You should never stop in an intersection, or turn down another road. You cannot anticipate where these vehicles are headed, so just pull over to the side of the road and wait for them to pass.

Also, when Emergency Vehicles are parked at the scene, steer clear of them. In this situation, you should slow down and move over. Emergency responders face enormous risks when working on the road. So, please make sure you give them room to do their jobs and keep everyone safe.

In addition, when Emergency Vehicles are returning to the Fire House, please STOP your vehicle and allow them to back into the building safely.



A LOOK AHEAD WHAT TO EXPECT IN THE VILLAGE IN 2024!

LAW PARK PARKING LOT

The Law Park parking lot will undergo some much needed work to increase the safety and traffic flow of the lot. This work includes changing curbs and new paving, to improve the flow of traffic entering and exiting the lot. Work is expected to begin in the spring of 2024 and be completed in 2- to 3-weeks by Village DPW crews with limited to no impact to traffic flow and limited impact to parking in the spaces new Pleasantville Road.

LONG HILL ROAD PUMP STATION COMFORT STATION

This project includes the decommissioning of water service equipment including pumps, shafts, and electrical equipment, and converting the existing structure to a comfort station for a future trail in the adjacent Village-owned property. This will be the first installation of an eco-friendly bathroom facility at one of our trail heads. The pump station was originally designed to provide the Village water from the New Croton Aqueduct adjacent to Long Hill Road, however, the pump station is currently out of service and would require significant capital expenditures to extract and treat water from the aqueduct. The former pump station will become a modern comfort station with composting toilet by the end of 2024.



PINE ROAD AND LAW PARK DRAINAGE UPGRADES

This project includes the installation of storm sewers and sidewalks along Pine Road east of Trump National Golf Club to Elm Road as well as improve drainage of the Law Park pond. While the work is being done on Pine and Elm, the real impact is to alleviate flooding that impacts Law Park and the critical pool area, which has been a problem during major storm events for years. Construction is expected to begin in the late 2024 or Spring of 2025 for 2- to 3-months and require some partial road closures on Pine Road. This project involves grant funding which may delay one of the phases to a future year if funding is not received in a timely manner.

RIVER ROAD 9A INTERSECTION WIDENING

This project to widen the intersection of River Road and 9A includes new curbs and new paving on River Road within 100' of the 9A. The purpose of the project is to improve safety and traffic flow at the intersection, allowing cars and busses for the Clearview School to enter and exit more safely and efficiently. Construction is expected to begin in late 2024 and take 2-3 weeks with limited partial road closures on River Road only. This project is contingent on Board of Trustee funding as a part of the capital budget process.

WATER MAIN RELINING

The project includes the cleaning and cement lining of a water supply main between Ridgecrest Road and Tower Hill Road through the Sleepy Hollow Country Club. Cleaning and lining the pipe improves water quality to residents of the Village. No interruption of water service is expected during construction though some low pressure during flushing may be experienced. Construction is expected to begin in the Fall of 2024 and be completed in 1- to 2- months.

CHAPPAQUA ROAD ROUTE 100 WATER MAIN REPLACEMENT

This project includes the replacement of existing water main on Chappaqua Road between the west edge of Route 100 to the east side of the bridge over the Pocantico River. The water main has reached its end of life, indicated by two costly emergency repairs in the last 4 years due. The duration of the project is unknown at this time but expected to be several months with limited road closures and limited impacts to water service.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS 2023 HIGHLIGHTS

YOUTH CENTER RENOVATION DPW staff completed the top floor renovation of the Community Youth Center on Van Lu Van Road. Village Staff replaced the floor, removed walls, replaced walls, installed sheetrock, performed minor electrical work, plumbing, installed windows and doors, installed new kitchen cabinets appliances and a new bathroom. Completed the entire restoration down to the final coat of paint. Estimated savings by not contracting out this work of \$100,000.



HUDSON VALLEY TRAILWAY CONNECTION Prior to the start of the contractor starting their work DPW staff installed 1800 liner feet of underground communication conduit and access manholes. DPW also excavated and installed the trail subbase. The Contractor installed the porous asphalt base and paved the trail with porous asphalt. This bike trail serves as a commuter connector between the NY Empire Trail and the business district. This project was sponsored by the Hudson Valley Greenway Grant program.

NORTH STATE ROAD WATER MAIN REPLACEMENT Replacement of the last 1200 liner feet of transite water main in the Village of Briarcliff Manor. Project also included new sidewalks, concreate curbing and paving of North State Road from Schrade Road to Chappaqua.



1050 PLEASANTVILLE ROAD PARKING LOT Following the demolition of the Wells Fargo Bank, DPW staff performed all the parking lot modifications. Working involving installing belgian block curb stones, drainage, signage, line striping, electrical site lighting and pavement replacement.



CROSS ACCESS PROJECT

Following a plan that was originally designed back in 1998 the Village has completed a project that connects the Village Hall parking lot to the downtown. Creating 18 additional parking spaces available to the public. Once the work is complete at 1123 & 1133 Pleasantville Road residents will be able to drive across the rear of the buildings on the east side of the central business district.



RECREATION HAS A YEAR OF REVISION AND REBUILDING



What a busy year the Recreation Department has had this past year, our first full "normal" one since COVID struck. Our year kicked off with a new Recreation Leader, Marc Medico who has overseen many youth programs,

including Camp Horizon and Camp Adventure as well as our Tennis Programs. We accepted the challenge of learning a new Recreation software system, Civic Rec allowing an online registration from anywhere you can get cell service or an internet connection. We went live on March 15th just in time for our Spring and Summer Registration Day Camp Registration. It was a bit bumpy of a start but this new program is a time saver for all using it staff and residents, all-encompassing software allowing court reservations, facility rentals, and a better tracking systems for permits and budgets. The interior of the Youth Center received a face lift, thanks to the Board of Trustees and help from the Department of Public works the entire upstairs was renovated from under-utilized space to an open floor plan. This is now a great space to rent for family gatherings, celebrations or meetings. This improvement added to our programming space. In the winter season the DPW also closed up the oculus at the Community Center so that we can host programs upstairs and downstairs at the same time without

interruption. A great improvement to add more to our offerings.

We welcomed our new residents with two New Neighbor Networks in 2023 February was adults only and October was for Families . We were happy to meet them, welcome them and give them a great start in their new village! The Village of Briarcliff was excited to team up with Rivertowns Media to offer a Picks

and Pickleball Event at Chilmark Park this past May. Even though it rained and we had to move to the rain date we had a great event for all to enjoy. Our senior adults enjoyed several great trips in 2023, they saw Gypsy and the Great Gatsby the musical, went on a trip to Grounds of Sculpture and saw the Jersey Dreamers in all their glory.

In June, the village upgraded the website site, which we are still mastering. So far we are happy with the new capabilities of adding pictures, email blasts, new flashes, and having a Recreation Calendar available to us and you! 2023 will be the year we started Briarcliff Bashes! We hosted two – one at Neighborhood park again that pesky rain came but didn't dampen a good time. The other Briarcliff Bash took place at Scarborough Park where we hosted a sunset concert on a Sunday Evening in one of the most picturesque locations in Briarcliff Manor. We appreciate all the support we had in this new venture! We also started to offer private and semi-private swim lessons at the pool for the first time and what a splash it was! We had about 63 individuals sign up for lessons.

As Fall was upon us we "squeezed" in our Annual Community Day Celebration thank goodness because then we had 8 weeks of rainy weekends in September and October. We welcomed Portraits in the Park over two weekends to have families an opportunity to get Fall shots taken for gifts, holiday cards or new wall art at home. We installed a new bike repair station near the Youth Center on the new connector trail from the village to the North County Trailway. Our team is bringing Youth Basketball Leagues back to the village with small steps hosting a 3rd and 4th grade division for boys with six teams and partnering with Ossining to over a 5th and 6th grade boys division.

As we finished up the year we had a bittersweet announcement our very own Stephanie Rossi, Recreation Assistant for the Village of Briarcliff Manor retired on December 29th after a 22 year career at the Village. She has capped off her career by being elected to the 2023 Westchester County Hall of Fame for Senior Adults. She will be missed especially by the seniors in our community and anyone who has attended the Holiday Sing-a-long as she is responsible for all the tasty treats. We are happy that she is about to start a new chapter and wish her nothing but a happy and long-lived retirement! We welcomed her replacements Joni Erlach and Kelly Vasta at the start of the New Year.

VOLUNTEER RESIDENT ADVISORY COMMITTEES AT WORK

Our local government thrives on the participation of residents who dedicate their time, energy and expertise to our Village. The Briarcliff Sustainability Advisory Committee B-SAC was formed with the goal of developing recommendations to improve sustainability in the Village, suggesting policies directly to the Village Manager and the Board of Trustees, and publishing educational materials to raise awareness of sustainability in our community. The committee determined that our most effective path to improving sustainability in Briarcliff Manor will be through New York State's Climate Smart Communities CSC program. The CSC program supports municipalities by providing 50/50 competitive grant funding to implement projects which reduce emissions and build resilience to extreme weather. Educational materials for all our campaigns programs were distributed via a variety of channels including flyers, social media posts on related sites, and our newly instituted quarterly newsletters. Since the library is an important means of information distribution, we also came up with a list of book recommendations to help build a Sustainability section at the Briarcliff Public Library.



During our first year, we implemented three major CSC certification actions a Zero Waste campaign, a Clean Energy Campaign, and an Electric Vehicle Campaign. The Zero Waste campaign promoted the environmental advantages of diverting household goods, clothing and food scraps from the landfill while simultaneously providing cost savings by decreasing the burden on DPW services.

ZERO WASTE CAMPAIGN Stash the Trash where residents signed up to clean specific neighborhood areas around the Village collecting approximately 100 bags of trash during two events. Take It Or Leave It where people donated approximately 4000 lbs of material ranging from



designer clothes to household appliances, keeping them out of the landfill. Approximately 1000 lbs of fabric scraps were picked up by Green Tree Textile Recycling NYC to be recycled into insulation. A Swap Events where we partnered with the Briarcliff Recreation Department to organize a Halloween costume swap event. People were able to choose from more than 200 donated costumes. All leftover costumes were donated to OPrime, the Community School Hub for the Ossining School District. The Holiday swap event organized in partnership with the Briarcliff Recreation Department was held on December 2-3, 2023. People were able to swap holiday items like gift wrap, ribbon, greeting cards, and decorations, keeping them out of the landfill.



CLEAN ENERGY CAMPAIGN We distributed information about clean heating and cooling options for homes at the 2022 and 2023 Community Day events, and through flyers and newsletters. We helped residents sign up for Grid Rewards, a demand response program which helps residents reduce energy usage at peak times and earn cash rewards. The Clean Heating Cooling and Grid Rewards programs were part of Briarcliff Manor's CSC initiative which brought in NYS grant funding for the Village. We distributed free LED light bulbs at our events.


ELECTRIC VEHICLE CAMPAIGN We partnered with Greater Hudson Valley Electric Vehicle Association to display the Volvo C40 Recharge electric car at our Earth Day 2023 event, and the Nissan Ariya electric car at our Community Day 2023 booth. We distributed information about rebates incentives available for electric vehicles through flyers and newsletters.

The Clean Energy and the Electric Vehicle campaigns will not only make our community cleaner and greener by improving air quality but will also help our community achieve cost savings through greater efficiency, greater energy independence and energy security.

The B-SAC looks forward to an active and productive year in 2024 where we will continue working with existing partners, while building new collaborations with other community organizations.


